Baroque Suite

Georg Philipp Telemann ~ Arr. Michael Hopkins

Telemann composed a great many overtures with orchestral suites included. These three movements that Prelude will open with include a Scaramouche (little skirmisher), Harlequin and Mezzetin. In these movements, Prelude hopes to exhibit Baroque syles of playing including contrasting short and long phrases, crescendos and decrescendos, as well as stair-stepped contrasts.

Largo

George Frideric Handel ~ Arr. Bob Cerulli

The notes of this flowing piece are not hard; rather it is the control of the bow that is the challenge. The Largo has a beautiful walking cello/bass line accompanying one of the most beautiful melodies of the time.

Allegro, from Brandenburg Concerto No. 3

Johann Sebastian Bach ~ Arr. Richard Meyer

This is Prelude's "challenge" piece, which has multiple melodies and parts of melodies woven together, in what is called a contrapuntal style. Counting, string crossing, and listening to one another have been our practice mainstays.

Chester

William Billings ~ Arr. Brad Pfeil

William Billings was not only perhaps the earliest recognized American composer (1746-1800), but was friends with Samuel Adams and Paul Revere. Chester became a Revolutionary War song for the colonists and was played by Washington's Continental Army! It is a good first piece for Overture, with a broad theme and a very bold statement.

Egmont Overture

Ludwig van Beethoven ~ Arr. Richard Meyer

Beethoven was also a "defier of tyranny" and Egmont was incidental music for the poet Goethe's tragedy. It is intense in its construction, alternating between anger, love, and triumph. A challenge for Overture, but so much fun to learn.

The Magic of Harry Potter

John Williams ~ Arr. Michael Story

This arrangement contains themes from all eight motion pictures in the Harry Potter series, including Hedwig's Theme, Nimbus 2000, Fawkes the Phoenix, Double Trouble, Hogwarts Hymn, among others. The students in Overture took to learning this like ducks to water, and we hope you enjoy this version.

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Semper Fidelis March

John Philip Sousa

John Philip Sousa's "Semper Fidelis March" was written in 1888, and is regarded as the official march of the United States Marine Corps. This piece was one of two that was composed from a request from United States President Chester A. Arthur as a way to recognize the officers and men of the United States Marine Corps. The title Semper Fidelis means "always faithful" and is played during Change of Command Ceremonies. The march follows Sousa's classic sound of being festive and light, and is often regarded as the best march Sousa ever composed.

Largo, from the Overture to Music for the Royal Fireworks George Frideric Handel

One of the foremost composers of the Baroque era, George Frideric Handel trained in Germany but spent much of his career in London. The *Music for the Royal Fireworks* was composed in 1749 for London's Green Park fireworks, in celebration of the end of the War of the Austrian Succession. Anthony Baines and Charles Mackerras adapted the Overture for modern orchestra in the mid 1900's.

Polovtsian Dances from the opera Prince Igor

Alexander Borodin

Alexander Borodin, the Russian composer of the opera Prince Igor would have thought himself as first a chemist, writing music only in his spare time. This may explain why Prince Igor remained unfinished at the time of Borodin's sudden death, despite him working on it for 18 years. It took two Russian composers, Rimsky-Korsakov and Aleksandr Glazunov, to complete the opera. Prince Igor is based on the epic poem The Tale of Igor's Campaign, which tells the tale of the Russian Prince Igor and his campaign to defend against invading nomadic tribes. Polovtsian Dances falls at the end of Act 2 where Khan Konchak orders his servants to entertain him and the captured Prince Igor. Through the music, one can see the different dances, starting with the lilting atmosphere of the Glidina Dance of the Young Maidens. It is followed by the forceful notes of the Wild Dance of the Men, then the spry tone of the Dance of the Boys, ending with the resounding finality of the General Dance. May we fulfill Khan's orders to "dispel all gloomy thoughts" with this majestic dance of music.

Pavane

Gabriel Fauré

Gabriel Fauré was an influential and prominent French composer during the late Romantic and early Modern eras of music. The Pavane was originally composed for piano but later arranged for the orchestra. Thereafter, an optional choral part was created, at the request of one of Fauré's supporters, Countess Greffulhe. A Pavane is a slow duple dance that was popular in the 16th and 17th centuries. Fauré's work shows this early influence, but significant elements of late 19th century romanticism are also heard in the great harmonic tension of the piece. Solo flute first presents the work's main gentle, longing melody. This is followed by solo oboe and clarinet with pizzicato strings, creating an ethereal floating quality. The listener gets lost within the fluid transitions that build tension slowly with each new entrance. There are moments that feel like fresh breaths of air within the ensemble such as when the flute passes the melody onto the violins through a prolonged trill. The middle portion contrasts with the opening with its dense and momentous statement as the lush tone of the cellos answer the high strings. With much work put in by each member of your Anchorage Youth Symphony, we hope that you enjoy the various colors of this piece as much as we enjoy presenting it to you and creating musical ideas!



Farandole from *L'Arlésienne*, Suite No. 2 Georges Bizet

Georges Bizet, most known for his operas, such as *Carmen* which he wrote as his last work, was a French composer of the Romantic era. Though he died at the early age of 36 in June of 1875, Bizet wrote thirty operas, one symphony, and many orchestral pieces. One of his compositions was *L'Arlesienne* which he wrote for Alphonse Daudet's short play of the same name. (In English; *The Girl from Arles.*) The play was not successful and was closed, though the music score was later used for two other suites of the same name. The last movement of the piece; *Farandole*, was inspired by the popular Christmas tune known as "March of the Kings" which dates back to 13th century France.

BIOGRAPHY DAVID HAGEN

David Hagen is delighted to have been chosen to serve as Principal Conductor of the Anchorage Youth Symphony for the 2024-25 Season. Mr. Hagen and his family have a long association with AYS: he himself played trumpet in the orchestra, and his two brothers and two sons were also members. Mr. Hagen's time playing in AYS was particularly formative for him as a young musician.



Mr. Hagen has been active as a conductor and music educator in Anchorage for many years. He

became artistic director and conductor of the Alaska Chamber Singers (ACS) in 1995, succeeding founder and artistic director Elvera Voth. Mr. Hagen also served as Chorus Master with Anchorage Opera for several seasons, preparing such works as *Carmen*, *Die Fledermaus*, *Romeo et Juliette* and *Sweeney Todd*. He served as general director of the Anchorage Festival of Music, and was the founder and music director of *AVE*, a vocal ensemble that performed to much acclaim in Anchorage in the 1990's.

Mr. Hagen recently retired from the Anchorage School District, where he served as an instrumental music teacher for many years, as well as Music Curriculum Coordinator for two years. His many compositions for beginning band are regularly heard at local band festivals.

Hagen received his earliest musical training in the Anchorage School District and is a graduate of Robert Service High School. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from George Fox University and a Master of Music degree in choral conducting from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music. He is a recipient of the Anchorage Mayor's Arts Award for Outstanding Individual Artist.

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

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Dr. Bruce Wood was appointed Music Director of Alaska Youth Orchestras in July of 2021. Dr. Wood was the founding Music Director of the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock, Texas while also serving on the faculty of Texas Tech University. From 2014 to 2021 Dr. Wood was the Director of Fine Arts for the Anchorage School District.





College in Sioux City, Iowa and his master's and doctorate degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Wood has taught in public school settings for eleven years and at the university level for over twenty-five years. He has been published by the American String Teacher Journal, Strings Magazine, and GIA publications.

A cellist and singer, Dr. Wood has been a member of the Alaska Chamber Singers. He has also conducted a number of the performances of the Anchorage Community Chorus Messiah. Dr. Wood's wife, Brooke, works for the Anchorage Museum.

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Our History

The Anchorage Youth Symphony was formed in 1965 by Frank Pinkerton and has continued under the leadership of prominent local musicians and educators including Dewey Ehling, Kurt Pasch, Jeanne (Ray) Bruhn, Charles Gorsuch, Marlow Thomas, and, most recently, Linn Weeda and Dr. Bruce Wood



In 1981 the Anchorage Youth Symphony Association began operating separately from the Anchorage School District and was granted 501(c)(3) nonprofit status. Shortly thereafter the organization adopted the name Alaska Youth Orchestras. Since then, the organization has remained an active member of the Anchorage arts community and has been a resident company of the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts since 2011.

Linn Weeda served as Music Director for 31 years, expanding the program to include coaching by local professional musicians, many who were in the youth symphony as young players. He retired in May 2021, succeeded in the role of Music Director by Bruce Wood, Ph.D. Dr. Wood and Executive Director Denise Brown-Chythlook further expanded AYO's education and performance programs, increasing their reach from 80 to 500 youth each year. The Anchorage Youth Symphony provides a professional performance experience for high school and college age musicians. Symphony School provides teaching ensembles for musicians from grades 4-12. AYO's outreach program, After School Music (a community partnership with Camp Fire Alaska), provides a music inspiration program in an after-school care setting.

In 2023, Pierre Derycz joined the AYO team as Executive Director, bringing a deep passion for music education and youth development. Under his leadership, AYO continues to participate in advocacy and community building efforts across the Anchorage Arts community.

At the conclusion of the 2023-24 Season, Dr. Bruce Wood announced his retirement from the position of Music Director. This fall, AYO begins its search for its next Music Director, with a tenure to begin in the 2025-26 Season.

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
